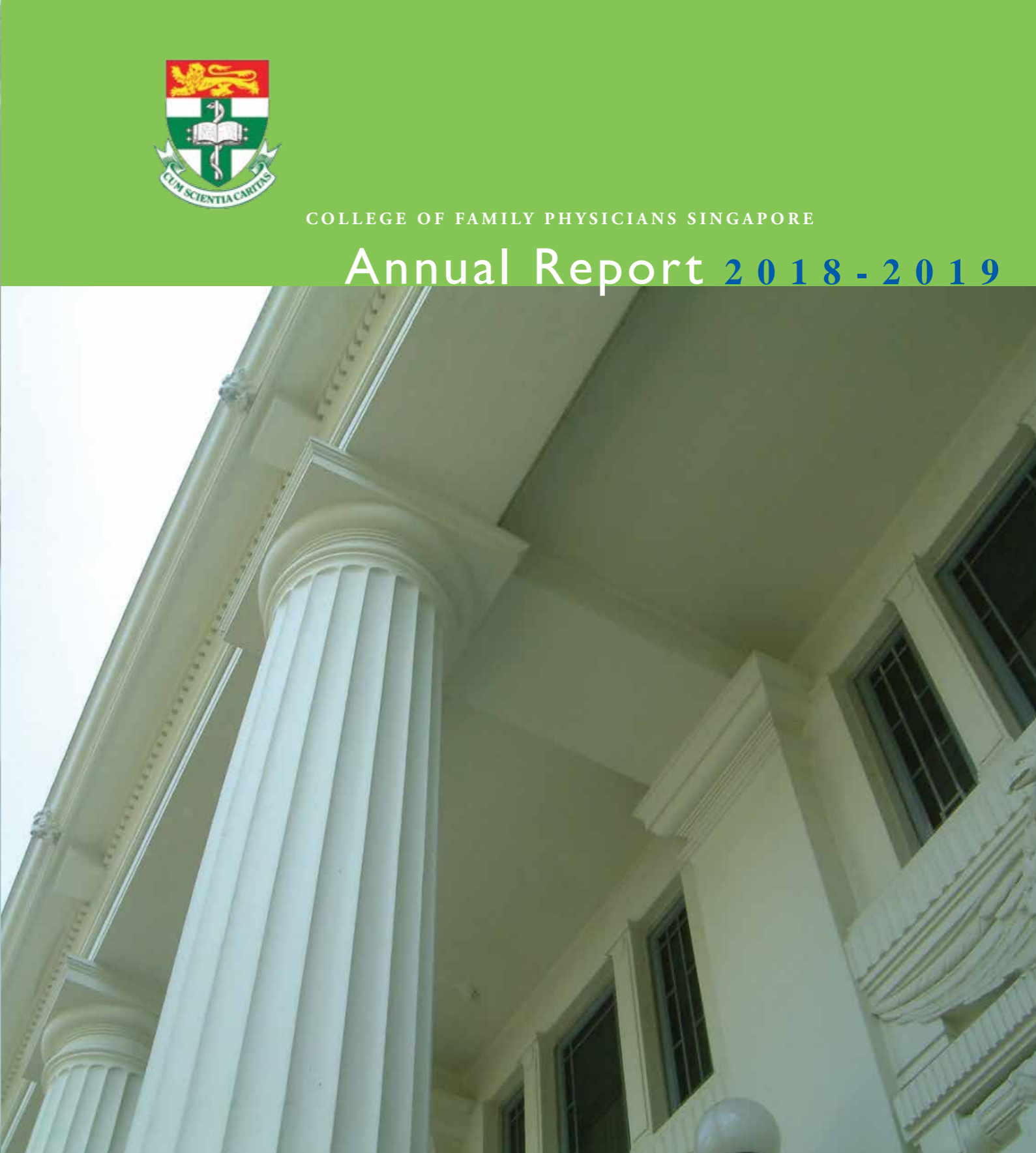

- 12) To do all such things as are incidental or conducive to the attainment of the foregoing objects or any of them

PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE 2019



The College has achieved much in the past 12 months. There have been many developments in family medicine and the College has been in the thick of them, representing the interests of the family physicians and GPs. Our engagement has been wide-ranging; from the fee benchmarking committee, to the NEHR debate, to the training of our FPs, to the Review Workgroup for SMC disciplinary process and informed consent taking standards. Our College representatives have been very busy in these committees, all with the aim of advancing family medicine. I am pleased to report that the 26th Council has done very well and its work is well reported in the pages below.

Membership

The membership of the College as of 31 March 2019 now stands at 2402. This compares with a membership of 1368 in 2009; over the past 10 years our membership has almost doubled! The growth of our membership augurs well for our vision to better represent our family medicine and primary care fraternity.

Assets

Financially, the College continues to be healthy through the prudent fiscal stewardship by the Council, and this gives us the stability and security to continue the mission of our College. Although we continue to generate a healthy surplus, we need to be constantly mindful of the need for fiscal prudence. The College is a not-for-profit organisation and does not receive any government funding, hence we must continue our good financial management to garner the resources to advance family medicine.

Courses conducted

The GDFM, MMed(FM) College Programme and Fellowship of the College of Family Physicians Singapore (By Assessment) (FCFPS) continue to do well. The curriculum and delivery of these programmes are being constantly reviewed and improved over the years. The enhanced curriculum for the GDFM to cater the needs of our ageing population has also been very well received. This academic year, for GDFM we have an enrolment of 222 doctors, for MMed 41 doctors and for Fellowship 17. We are encouraged by this and are glad the interest in family medicine as a career continues to be strong.

Partnerships

Our College continues to work closely with our sister professional bodies, the Singapore Medical Association and the Academy of Medicine Singapore. Most recently the three bodies were called to be part of the Review Workgroup for SMC disciplinary process and informed consent taking standards. By working together, we strengthen the ties and collaborations between specialities and settings, and this bodes well for the unity of the profession.

The College also enjoys a good working relationship with the Ministry of Health and the Singapore Medical Council. We work closely with the various divisions of the Ministry of Health (MOH), such as the Primary and Community Care Division, the Agency for Care Effectiveness and the Agency for Integrated Care, and this has allowed for MOH programmes and policies to be better tailored for our doctors in the community.

The College has also collaborated in CME events with our specialist colleagues from various institutions and organisations such as the Nephrology Society of Singapore, the National Centre for Infectious Diseases, the Department of TB Control and the Workplace Health and Safety Division of the Ministry of Manpower. The increasing recognition of the important role of family medicine in the health of our nation is timely. We are very proud of our family physicians who have represented the College, speaking at these talks and symposia from a family medicine perspective.

Major Developments

As medical education evolves around the world, we in Singapore must evolve along with it. Last year, the College sent a delegation to GPTEC 2018, a GP training conference held in Adelaide Australia. We were well received by our hosts, and were able to learn much about the Australian training methods. We also examined systems being piloted by MOH, and also systems from Ireland, carefully assessing the various options to determine which would be the best fit for our requirements. After careful deliberation, our College has signed a memorandum of understanding with Ireland, and will be running a pilot of their learning management system for our Masters programme in the coming academic intake. The pilot will see the introduction of EPAs [entrustable professional activities] and programmatic assessment into our training programmes. Our ultimate aim is to unify our training programmes along a single training track.

We are now at the end of the term of the 26th Council. Our dedicated Council Members have given much of themselves and worked tirelessly for you and the profession! The College academic faculty have also served selflessly in our training programmes. Their commitment and dedication to their craft as educators means that we can mentor and pass on the skills and knowledge to the next generation of family physicians. A huge word of thanks to you all!

All of this could not have been possible but for our very hard working and efficient secretariat. Their dedication to the task at hand has been commendable, and we are very grateful and glad for their service. Thank you, Jennifer, Anica, Patricia, Joel, Qiyin, Guorong, Chester, Peggy, Jin Fen and Emily!

It has been my greatest privilege and honour to serve the College and the fraternity. It is by your continued support and mandate that we are able to continue the good work of the College.

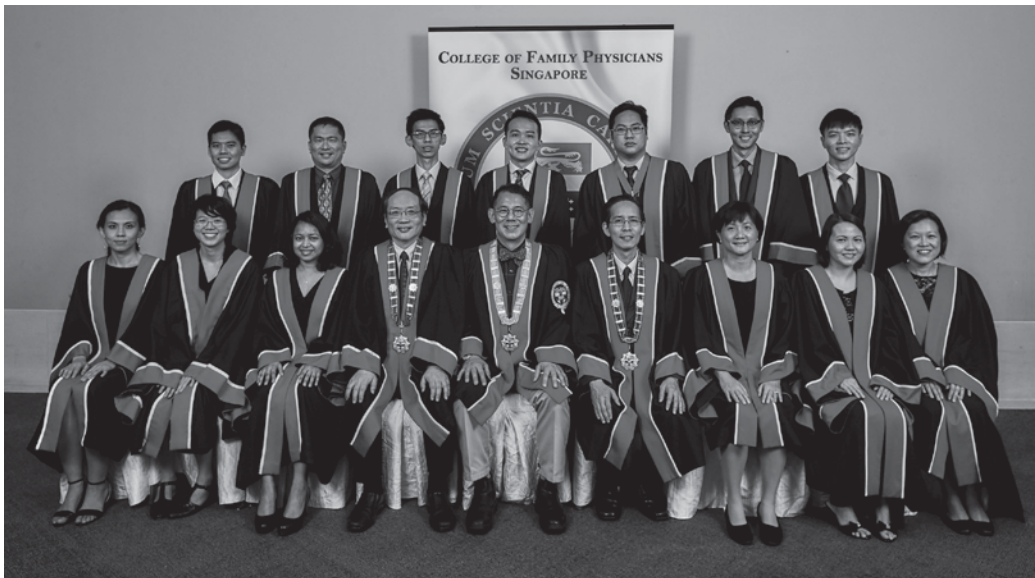

CONTINUING PROFESSIONAL DEVELOPMENT/ MEDICAL EDUCATION PROGRAMMES AND COURSES

The College promotes Continuing Professional Development (CPD) and Continuing Medical Education (CME) through the Family Medicine Modular Course, Family Practice Skills Course, MMed (Family Medicine) College Programme, Family Medicine Membership and Fellowship Programme.

The Institute of Family Medicine (IFM), an organ within the College, plays a significant role in developing the contents and syllabi of these programmes and courses.

During the year the IFM reviewed, updated and edited the notes as well as their e-learning components for Modules 8, 1, 2 and 3 of the Family Medicine Modular Course to make them more relevant and user-friendly to the course participants.

The Family Medicine Modular Course consists of 8 modules of knowledge acquisition and is a requirement for doctors who are preparing for the Graduate Diploma in Family Medicine (GDFM) Programme and the Master of Medicine (Family Medicine) College Programme. Each year, four modules are covered.

For the year April 2018 - March 2019, there were 247 trainees registered in the GDFM course, 20 trainees in the MMed(FM) College Programme and 19 trainees in the Fellowship [FCFP(S)] programme.

Family Practice Skills Course (FPSC)

During this financial year, the College conducted seven Family Practice Skills Courses.

The components of a skills course may include one or more of the following:

1. Distance Learning with verification (6 CME points upon attaining minimum pass grade of 60% in online MCQ Assessment)
2. Seminars (2 CME points per seminar)
3. Workshops (1 CME point per workshop)
4. Small group activities including clinical attachments, tutorials, ward-rounds (for some courses)
5. Assessments which can be written, oral, demonstration and/or clinical (for some courses)

A typical FPSC template is a course with six units of distance learning with 30 MCQs test, conducted in two seminars, and also workshops conducted over two afternoon sessions typically, one on Saturday afternoon and one on Sunday afternoon.

E-Learning

The E-Learning programme launched in 2003 has been incorporated into the GDFM training programme. An E-Learning component for each module was introduced, consisting of therapeutic notes, case scenarios, assessment by MCQs and a case review to be put up by a tutorial group.

Accreditation of core CME points

The College is represented by Adj Asst Prof Tan Tze Lee in the Singapore Medical Council (SMC) CME Co-ordinating Committee. The College works closely with the SMC to ensure that the quality of the CME events is acceptable. It continues to advise SMC on the accreditation of core Family Medicine CME events through its panel of Family Medicine (FM) CME advisors appointed by the College.

COMMENCEMENT OF THE ACADEMIC YEAR

The Commencement of the academic year for 2019 will take place at the Academia, SGH on 27 July 2019.

GRADUATE DIPLOMA OF FAMILY MEDICINE (GDFM)

The Graduate Diploma in Family Medicine (GDFM) is a vocational training certification for primary care doctors. The aim of this 2-year part-time trainee programme is to train primary care doctors to practise Family Medicine at an enhanced level to meet the needs of the child, the adolescent, the adult and the elderly. The course emphasises on basic clinical, diagnostic and management skills essential to general practice.

The programme is planned to accommodate the busy doctor's schedule as almost all courses that require in-person attendance are conducted outside regular office hours. The course consists of the following:

- 8 modules of Family Medicine Modular Course (FMMC) with each comprising of 4 workshops, 1 tutorial, online case studies and multiple choice assessments
- 3 Practice Management Courses and 1 elective Family Practice Skills Course

The examination is conducted by Division of Graduate Medical Studies (DGMS), National University of Singapore (NUS). The standard set is a pass in all three segments:

- Written paper I - Applied Knowledge Test: 100 MCQ questions (2 hours)
- Written Paper II - Key Features Problems (KFP): 10 questions (1 hour)
- Skills Assessment in the Objective Structured Clinical Examination (OSCE) - 10 stations of 11 minutes each, comprising 3 minutes for reading and 8 minutes for assessment (2 hours)

The GDFM(NUS) is a title or qualification approved by the Singapore Medical Council for display by Registered Medical Practitioners.

The 17th GDFM Examination was held on 29 June 2018 for the written papers and 7 & 14 July 2018 for the OSCE. A total of 134 of the 182 candidates passed, giving a passing rate of 73% for the GDFM Examination 2018.

MASTER OF MEDICINE (FAMILY MEDICINE) [MMed(FM)]

There are currently two programmes to prepare doctors for the MMed(FM) examinations.

Family Medicine Residency Programme

The Family Medicine Residency Programme aims to equip the resident with educational and clinical experiences in accordance with ACGME-I standards, which focuses on structured training and close supervision. The resident will undergo clinical rotations in the hospitals and polyclinics, call-back sessions and teaching sessions that combine foundation teaching, continuity clinics, skills workshops/attachments and community medicine.

MMed(FM) College Programme

The programme is a structured training programme designed for mature practising family physicians in Singapore. The programme is jointly organised by the College of Family Physicians Singapore and the DGMS, NUS. This 16-month part-time course provides a comprehensive and structured training programme for doctors working in primary care who have completed the 8 modules of the Family Medicine Modular Course (FMMC) to prepare them to sit for the MMed(FM) examinations.

The course participants from both the Programmes sit for the same examination – namely, the MMed(FM) examination conducted by the DGMS, NUS.

This examination consists of:

- Written
 - 250 multiple-choice questions
- Clinical
 - Logbook-based viva assessment
 - Slides-based short answer questions
 - Clinical Skills Assessment Stations

The 28th Master of Medicine (Family Medicine) Examination was held on 21 July 2018 (Written), 31 October, 3, 5, 9 and 10 November 2018 (Clinical). Of the 77 candidates who sat for the examination, 63 were successful.

THE AWARD OF MCFP(S) BY ASSESSMENT

The criteria for the award were as follows:

1) Professional

- Be an Ordinary or Associate Member of the College of Family Physicians Singapore for at least 2 years
- Has held a registrable or acceptable qualification for not less than 3 years
- Has been engaged in family practice for not less than 3 years, or has undergone an approved training programme for at least 2 years in disciplines relevant to family practice as may from time to time be defined
- Be in professional good standing

2) Academic

- Possess MRCGP(UK) or equivalent family medicine training and qualification, AND GDFM OR
- Possess MMed (Internal Medicine) or MRCP(UK) or equivalent internal medicine training and qualification, AND GDFM with at least 6 months experience working in a family medicine practice setting of which at least 3 months must be in primary ambulatory care within the last 3 years

3) Assessment

- Submit a log of 40 cases in the SOAP format showcasing the spectrum of Family Medicine comprising acute and chronic cases as well as preventive medicine. The cases must include at least 10% Obstetrics and Gynaecology cases, 10% Paediatric cases, 10% Geriatric cases
- Submit video consultations of 3 Adult Medicine cases and 3 Paediatric cases
- Pass both the viva voce of the log of the 40 cases as well as the viva voce of the video consultations
- The MCFP(S) by Assessment was not conducted in 2018.
- As of 31 March 2019, there were a total of **323** Collegiate members.

Family Practice Skills Course (FPSC)

The Family Practice Skills Courses (FPSC) continue to serve the continuing professional development needs of the General Practitioner/ Family Physician. Each skills course includes one or more of the following components in which the family physician can choose to participate in:

- Distance Learning with verification (6 CME points upon attaining minimum pass grade of 60% in online MCQ Assessment)
- Seminars (2 CME points per seminar)
- Workshops (1 CME point per workshop)
- Small group activities including clinical attachments, tutorials, ward-rounds (for some courses)
- Assessments which can be written, oral, demonstration and/or clinical (for some courses)

Table 6 shows the number of doctors who participated in the Family Practice Skills Course for the year under review.

The IFM is encouraged by the big increase in the number of doctors enrolled in the GDFM modular courses year on year. The Family Practice Skills Courses also saw an increase in some of the courses.

The enrolment numbers in the 2018 intake was 247 compared to 236 in the 2017 intake. The 4 Family Practice Skills Courses had attendances ranging from 122 to 225 in the seminars and 110 to 220 in the workshop; the number of doctors who did the CME reading and passed the MCQs ranged from 186 to 516. Newer topics attracted bigger attendances e.g., the Extended Consultation, and Updates in Rheumatology.

We look forward to another year of serving our members.

We have nothing to report in this regard.

Management is responsible for the preparation of financial statements that give a true and fair view in accordance with the provisions of the Acts and FRSs, and for devising and maintaining a system of internal accounting controls sufficient to provide a reasonable assurance that assets are safeguarded against loss from unauthorised use or disposition; and transactions are properly authorised and that they are recorded as necessary to permit the preparation of true and fair financial statements and to maintain accountability of assets.

Responsibilities of Management and Management Committee for the Financial Statements (continued)

In preparing the financial statements, management is responsible for assessing the Group's ability to continue as a going concern, disclosing, as applicable, matters related to going concern and using the going concern basis of accounting unless management either intends to liquidate the Group or to cease operations, or has no realistic alternative but to do so.

The Management Committee's responsibilities include overseeing the Group's financial reporting process.

Auditor's Responsibilities for the Audit of the Financial Statements

Our objectives are to obtain reasonable assurance about whether the financial statements as a whole are free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error, and to issue an auditor's report that includes our opinion. Reasonable assurance is a high level of assurance, but is not a guarantee that an audit conducted in accordance with SSAs will always detect a material misstatement when it exists. Misstatements can arise from fraud or error and are considered material if, individually or in the aggregate, they could reasonably be expected to influence the economic decisions of users taken on the basis of these financial statements.

As part of an audit in accordance with SSAs, we exercise professional judgement and maintain professional scepticism throughout the audit. We also:

- Identify and assess the risks of material misstatement of the financial statements, whether due to fraud or error, design and perform audit procedures responsive to those risks, and obtain audit evidence that is sufficient and appropriate to provide a basis for our opinion. We communicate with the Management Committee regarding, among other matters, the planned scope and timing of the audit and significant audit findings, including any significant deficiencies in internal control that we identify during our audit.

NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS - 31 March 2019

The following notes form an integral part of the financial statements.

1. GENERAL INFORMATION

1.1 The College of Family Physicians Singapore is a College registered in Singapore under the Societies Act, Cap. 311. It is also a charity registered under the Charities Act, Cap.37. Its registered office is located at 16 College Road #01-02 College of Medicine Building Singapore 169854.

1.2 The principal activities of the College are to provide education services for undergraduate and postgraduate study courses.

The principal activity of the subsidiary company is set out in note 11 to the financial statements.

2. SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES

2.1 Basis of Preparation

The financial statements are presented in Singapore dollars (“\$”), which is also the functional currency of the Group.

These financial statements are prepared in accordance with the historical cost convention except as disclosed in the accounting policies below, and comply with Singapore Financial Reporting Standards (FRSs), including related Interpretations promulgated by the Accounting Standards Council.

During the financial year, the company adopted all the applicable new/revised FRSs which are effective on or before 1 April 2018.

2.1.1 Adoption of FRSs effective in 2019

On 1 April 2018, the Group adopted the new or amended FRSs that are mandatory for application for the current financial year. Changes to the Group’s accounting policies have been made as required, in accordance with the transitional provisions in the respective FRSs, as disclosed below.

(a) Adoption of FRS 109 Financial Instruments

The Group has adopted the new Standard retrospectively from 1 April 2018, in line with the transition provisions permitted under the Standard. Comparatives for financial year 2018 are not restated and there are no significant difference between the carrying amounts at 31 March 2018 and 1 April 2018 which are required to be recognised in the operating revenue reserve. The accounting policies for financial instruments under FRS 109 are disclosed in Note 2.10.

The effects on adoption of FRS 109 are described below:

There was no significant change to the measurement basis arising from the new classification and measurement model under FRS 109.

Cash and cash equivalents and receivables, previously classified as “loans and receivables” under FRS 39 and measured on amortised cost basis, continue to be accounted for using the amortised cost model under FRS 109.

2.1 Basis of Preparation (continued)

2.1.1 Adoption of FRSs effective in 2019 (continued)

(a) Adoption of FRS 109 Financial Instruments (continued)

Receivables are assessed for impairment on a forward-looking basis under the expected credit loss impairment model of FRS 109, whereas previously, impairment under FRS 39 was recognised only when there is objective evidence of incurred losses. The adoption of FRS 109 did not result in additional impairment allowances recognised as at 1 April 2018.

(b) Adoption of FRS 115 Revenue from Contracts with Customers

The Group has adopted the new Standard using the modified retrospective approach with the cumulative impact of the adoption, if any, recognised in the opening revenue reserve at 1 April 2018. Comparative information for 2018 are not restated.

The adoption of FRS 115 on 1 April 2018 did not result in significant changes to the recognition criteria for the Group's revenue arrangements. The accounting policies for revenue from contracts with customers under FRS 115 are disclosed in note 2.4.

2.2 Significant Accounting Estimates and Judgements

Estimates, assumptions concerning the future and judgments are made in the preparation of the financial statements. They affect the application of the Group's accounting policies, reported amounts of assets, liabilities, income and expenses, and disclosures made. They are assessed on an ongoing basis and are based on experience and relevant factors, including expectations of future events that are believed to be reasonable under the circumstances.

(A) Key sources of estimation uncertainty

The key assumptions concerning the future and other key sources of estimation uncertainty at the balance sheet date that have a significant risk of causing a material adjustment to the carrying amounts of assets and liabilities within the next financial year are discussed below.

(i) Depreciation on Property, Plant and Equipment and Investment Property

The cost of property, plant and equipment and investment property are depreciated on a straight line basis over their estimated useful lives. Management's estimates of the useful lives of these property, plant and equipment and investment property are disclosed in notes 2.8 and 2.9 respectively. Changes in the expected usage and technological developments could impact the economic useful lives and the residual values of these assets. Therefore, future depreciation charges could be revised. The carrying amount of property, plant and equipment and investment property and the depreciation charge for the year are disclosed in notes 9 and 10 to the financial statements respectively.

(ii) Income Taxes

Significant judgment is involved in determining the provision for income taxes. There are certain transactions and computations for which the ultimate tax determination is uncertain during the ordinary course of business. The Group recognises liabilities for expected tax issues based on estimates of whether additional taxes will be due. Where the final tax outcome of these matters is different from the amounts that were initially recognised, such differences will impact the income tax provision in the period in which such determination is made.

2.2 Significant Accounting Estimates and Judgements (continued)

(A) Key Sources Of Estimation Uncertainty (continued)

(iii) *Expected Credit Losses On Receivables*

Expected Credit Losses (ECLs) are probability-weighted estimates of credit losses over the life of a financial instrument. In estimating ECLs to determine the probability of default of its debtors, the Group has used historical information, such as past credit loss experience. Where applicable, historical data are adjusted to reflect the effects of current conditions as well as management's assessment of future economic conditions based on observable market information, which involved significant estimates and judgement.

Based on management's assessment, there are no ECLs on the Group's receivables at the balance sheet date.

(iv) *Impairment of Non-Financial Assets*

The carrying amounts of the Group's non-financial assets subject to impairment are reviewed at each balance sheet date to determine whether there is any indication of impairment. If such indication exists, the asset's recoverable amount is estimated based on the higher of the value in use and the asset's fair value less cost of disposal. Estimating the value in use requires critical judgment on the part of the management to make an estimate of the expected future cash flows from the continuing use of the assets and also to choose a suitable discount rate in order to calculate the present value of those cash flows, both of which require significant judgement.

(B) Critical Judgments Made In Applying Accounting Policies

In the process of applying the Group's accounting policies, there are no significant items in the financial statements which require the exercise of critical judgment on the part of the management.

2.3 FRSs issued but not yet effective

The Group has not applied any new FRS that has been issued but is not yet effective. The directors plan to adopt this FRS in the first financial year commencing on or after their respective effective dates.

The following is the only new FRS issued but is not yet effective that is relevant to the Group's financial statements:

FRS 116 Leases

FRS 116, which replaces *FRS 17 Leases* and the related Interpretations when it becomes effective, requires lessees to recognise most leases on the balance sheet to reflect the rights to use the leased assets and the associated obligations for lease payments as well as the corresponding interest expense and depreciation charges. The Standard includes two recognition exemptions for lessees - short-term leases and leases of 'low value' assets.

Lessor accounting requirements under FRS 116 are substantially the same as the current FRS 17. A lessor continues to classify its leases as either operating leases or finance leases, and to account for those two types of leases differently.

Potential impact on financial statements

The Group will apply FRS 116 retrospectively in accordance with the requirements of the Standard on 1 April 2019.

Based on preliminary assessment of the College's existing operating lease arrangements as a lessee, the management expects most of the operating leases to be recognised as right-of-use assets with corresponding lease liabilities under the new standard.

2.4 Revenue Recognition

The accounting policies for revenue recognition from 1 April 2018 under FRS 115 are as follows:

Revenue is measured based on the consideration to which the Group expects to be entitled in exchange for transferring promised goods or services to a customer, excluding amounts collected on behalf of third parties.

Revenue is recognised when the Group satisfies a performance obligation by transferring a promised good or service to the customer, to which is when the customer obtains control of the good or service. A performance obligation may be satisfied at a point in time or overtime. The amount of revenue recognised is the amount allocated to the satisfied performance obligation.

(i) Course and seminar fees

Income from course and seminar fees (from continuing professional education and training) are recognised when the services are rendered.

(ii) Sponsorships

Income from sponsorships is recognised when received or when it becomes receivable and related performance obligations are fulfilled.

(iii) Subscriptions and entrance fees

Membership subscriptions are recognised as income over the membership term and entrance fees are recognised as income when they are due.

(iv) Advertising income

Advertising income is recognised when advertisements are placed and the related performance obligations are fulfilled.

2.4 Revenue Recognition (continued)

(v) Registration fees

Registration fees are recognised as income when the workshop events are completed.

(vi) Rental income

Rental income from operating lease is recognised on a straight line basis over the lease period.

(vii) Interest income

Interest income is recognised in profit or loss on a time-proportion basis, using the effective interest method.

2.5 Government Grants

Government grants are recognised when there is reasonable assurance that the grant will be received and the conditions attached to the grant will be complied with. Grants related to income are recognised in profit or loss on a systematic basis over the periods in which the Group recognises as expenses the related costs for which the grants are intended to compensate.

2.6 Employee Benefits

(i) Defined Contribution Plans

The Group makes contributions to the state provident fund (Central Provident Fund). Such contributions are recognised as compensation expenses in the same period as the employment that gave rise to the contributions.

(ii) Short-term Compensated Absences

Employee entitlements to annual leave are recognised when they accrue to employees. A provision is made for the estimated liability for employee entitlements to annual leave as a result of services rendered by employees up to the balance sheet date.

2.7 Income Taxes

Income tax on the profit or loss for the year comprises current and deferred tax. Income tax is recognised in profit or loss except to the extent that it relates to items recognised outside profit or loss (either in other comprehensive income or directly to accumulated fund), in which case, it is recognised in other comprehensive income or directly to accumulated fund accordingly.

Current tax is the expected tax payable on the taxable income for the year, using tax rates enacted or substantially enacted at the balance sheet date, and any adjustment to tax payable in respect of previous years.

Deferred income tax is provided, using the balance sheet liability method, on all temporary differences at the balance sheet date arising between the tax bases of assets and liabilities and their carrying amounts in the financial statements. Currently enacted tax rates are used in the determination of deferred income tax.

2.7 Income Taxes (continued)

Deferred tax assets are recognised to the extent that it is probable that future taxable profits will be available against which the temporary differences can be utilised.

Deferred income tax is provided on all taxable temporary differences arising on investment in subsidiary company except where the timing of the reversal of the temporary difference can be controlled and it is probable that the temporary difference will not reverse in the foreseeable future.

Deferred tax is charged or credited to other comprehensive income or directly in accumulated fund if the tax relates to items that are credited or charged, in the same or a different period, to other comprehensive income or directly to accumulated fund.

2.8 Property, Plant and Equipment

All items of property, plant and equipment are initially recorded at cost. The cost of an item of property, plant and equipment is recognised as an asset when it is probable that future economic benefits associated with the item will flow to the Group and the cost of the item can be measured reliably.

Property, plant and equipment are stated at cost less accumulated depreciation and impairment loss, if any.

Any estimated costs of dismantling and removing the property, plant and equipment and reinstating the site to its original condition (reinstatement costs) are capitalised as part of the cost of the property, plant and equipment.

Depreciation is calculated on the straight line basis so as to write off the cost, less the residual value, of the assets over their estimated useful lives. The estimated useful lives are as follows:

Furniture, fittings and renovation	3 to 5 years
Computers and office equipment	3 to 5 years
Paintings and potteries	10 years

Fully depreciated assets are retained in the financial statements until they are no longer in use.

The residual values, useful lives and depreciation methods of property, plant and equipment are reviewed and adjusted as appropriate, at each financial year-end.

An item of property, plant and equipment is derecognised upon disposal or when no future economic benefits are expected from its use or disposal. The gain or loss arising from the derecognition of an item of property, plant and equipment is determined as the difference between the net disposal proceeds, if any, and the carrying amount of the item, and shall be included in profit or loss when the item is derecognised.

2.9 Investment Property

Investment property, which is held on a long term basis for investment potential and rental income, is stated at cost less accumulated depreciation and any impairment loss, recognised in accordance with note 2.16 to the financial statements. Depreciation is calculated on the straight line basis so as to write off the cost, less residual value, of the assets over their estimated useful lives. The estimated useful life is as follows:

Leasehold property	50 years
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The residual value, useful life and depreciation method of investment property are reviewed and adjusted as appropriate, at each financial year-end.

The cost of major renovations and improvements is capitalised as additions and the carrying amounts of replaced components are written off to profit or loss. The costs of maintenance, repairs and minor improvement are charged to profit or loss when incurred.

Upon the disposal of investment property, the difference between the net disposal proceeds and the carrying amount of the asset is recognised in profit or loss.

2.10 Financial assets

Financial assets are recognised on the balance sheet when the Group becomes a contractual party to the contractual provisions of the financial instrument. Purchases and sales of investments are recognised on trade-date, that is, the date of which the Group commits to purchase or sell the asset.

Financial assets are derecognised when the rights to receive cash flows from the financial assets have expired or have been transferred and the Group has transferred substantially all risks and rewards of ownership.

2.10.1 Accounting for financial assets from 1 April 2018

A. Classification

The accounting for financial assets from 1 April 2018 under FRS 109 is as follows:

Financial assets are classified into the following measurement categories:

- Amortised cost;
- Fair value through other comprehensive income (FVOCI); and
- Fair value through profit or loss (FVPL).

The basis of classification depends on the Group's business model and the contractual cash flow characteristics of the financial assets.

B. At initial recognition

At initial recognition, the Group measures a financial asset at its fair value plus, in the case of a financial asset not at fair value through profit or loss, transaction costs that are directly attributable to the acquisition of the financial assets. Transaction costs of financial assets carried at fair value through profit or loss are expensed in profit or loss. Receivables that do not have a significant financing component are measured at their transaction price at initial recognition.

C. At subsequent measurement

There are three prescribed subsequent measurement categories - at amortised cost, FVOCI and FVPL, depending on the Group's business model in managing the financial assets and the cash flow characteristics of the assets.

The Group's financial assets, comprising mainly of receivables, and cash and cash equivalents, are measured at amortised cost subsequent to initial recognition, as these are contractual cash flows which represent solely payments of principal and interest. A gain or loss on a financial asset that is subsequently measured at amortised cost and is not part of a hedging relationship is recognised in profit or loss when the asset is derecognised or impaired. Interest income from these financial assets are recognised using the effective interest rate method.

D. Impairment of Financial Assets

The Group assesses on forward looking basis the expected credit losses associated with its debt instruments carried at amortised cost, and recognises a loss allowance accordingly.

At each reporting date, the debt instruments are assessed to determine whether there is significant increase in credit risk on the debt instruments since initial recognition. If there is a significant increase in credit risk since initial recognition, lifetime expected credit losses will be calculated and recognised in the loss allowance. If credit risk on the debt instrument has not increased significantly since initial recognition, the loss allowance is measured based on 12-month expected credit losses. Adjustments to the loss allowance are recognised in profit or loss as an impairment gain or loss.

For receivables, the Group applies the simplified approach permitted by FRS 109, which requires expected lifetime losses to be recognised from initial recognition of the receivables.

2.10.2 *Accounting for financial assets prior 1 April 2018*

Prior to 1 April 2018, the accounting for financial assets under FRS 39 were as follows:

A. Classification and measurement

The Group classifies its financial assets, comprising receivables, cash and banks deposits as loans and receivables.

B. Loans and Receivables

Loans and receivables are non-derivative financial assets with fixed or determinable payments that are not quoted in an active market. They arise when the Group provides money, goods, or services directly to a debtor with no intention of trading the receivable. They are included in current assets, except for those maturing more than 12 months after the balance sheet date. These are classified as non-current assets.

Loans and receivables are recognised initially at fair value and subsequently measured at amortised cost using the effective interest method. Receivables with a short duration are not discounted.

C. Impairment of Financial Assets

The Group assesses at each balance sheet date whether there is objective evidence that a financial asset or a group of financial assets is impaired.

Impairment of Loans and Receivables

If there is objective evidence that an impairment loss on loans and receivables carried at amortised cost has occurred, the amount of the loss is measured as the difference between the asset's carrying amount and the present value of estimated future cash flows, discounted at the original effective interest rate (i.e. the effective interest rate computed at initial recognition of these financial assets). The carrying amount of the asset shall be reduced either directly or through the use of an allowance account. The amount of the loss shall be recognised in profit or loss.

If, in a subsequent period, the amount of the impairment loss decreases and the decrease can be related objectively to an event occurring after the impairment was recognised, the previously recognised impairment loss shall be reversed either directly or by adjusting an allowance account. The amount of the reversal shall be recognised in profit or loss.

2.11 Investment in Subsidiary Company

(i) Subsidiary and Basis of Consolidation

Investment in subsidiary company is held on a long term basis and stated in the Group's balance sheet at cost less impairment loss, if any.

Subsidiary is the entity over which the Group has control. The Group controls an entity when the Group is exposed to, or has rights to, variable returns from its involvement with the entity and has the ability to affect those returns through its power over the entity. Subsidiary is consolidated from the date on which control is transferred to the Group, and continues to be consolidated until the date that such control ceases.

(i) Subsidiary and Basis of Consolidation (continued)

The consolidated financial statements comprise the financial statements of the College and its subsidiary company made up to the balance sheet date. The financial statements of the subsidiary company is prepared for the same reporting date as the College. Consistent accounting policies are applied for like transactions and events in similar circumstances.

All intra-group balances, income and expenses and unrealised gains and losses resulting from intra-group transactions are eliminated in full.

(ii) Acquisitions

The acquisition method of accounting is used to account for business combinations by the Group. The consideration transferred for the acquisition of a subsidiary or business comprises the fair value of the assets transferred, the liabilities incurred and the equity interests issued by the Group. The consideration transferred also includes the fair value of any contingent consideration arrangement and the fair value of any pre-existing equity interest in the subsidiary.

Acquisition-related costs are expensed as incurred. Identifiable assets acquired and liabilities and contingent liabilities assumed in a business combination are, with limited exceptions, measured initially at their fair values at the acquisition date. On an acquisition-by-acquisition basis, the Group recognises any non-controlling interest in the acquiree at the date of acquisition either at fair value or at the non-controlling interest's proportionate share of the acquiree's net identifiable assets.

The excess of the consideration transferred, the amount of any non-controlling interest in the acquiree and the acquisition-date fair value of any previous equity interest in the acquiree over the fair value of the net identifiable assets acquired is recorded as goodwill.

Any excess of the Group's interests in the net fair value of the identifiable assets, liabilities and contingent liabilities over the cost of business combination is recognised in profit or loss on the date of acquisition.

(iii) Disposals

When a change in the Group ownership interest in a subsidiary results in a loss of control over the subsidiary, the assets and liabilities of the subsidiary including any goodwill are derecognised. Amounts previously recognised in other comprehensive income in respect of that entity are also reclassified to profit or loss or transferred directly to retained earnings if required by a specific Standard.

Any retained equity interest in the entity is remeasured at fair value. The difference between the carrying amount of the retained interest at the date when control is lost and its fair value is recognised in profit or loss.

2.12 Trade and other receivables

Trade and other receivables that do not have a significant financing component are measured at their transaction price at initial recognition, and subsequently measured at amortised cost using the effective interest method, less any allowance for expected

2.13 Cash and cash equivalents

Cash and cash equivalents comprise cash in hand, cash at bank and fixed deposits which are subject to insignificant risks of changes in value. For the purpose of the statement of cash flows, fixed deposits with original maturities more than 3 months are excluded from cash and cash equivalents.

2.14 Funds

Accumulated fund is unrestricted fund available for use at the discretion of the Management Committee for the furtherance of the Group's objectives.

Miscellaneous funds are restricted funds which are designated for awards, fellowships, research support and projects of the Group. Currently, the Group has 4 miscellaneous funds, namely, Dr Koh Eng Kheng Award Fund, Primary Care Research Fund, Victor Louis Fernandez Fellowship Fund and Albert & Mary Lim Award Fund, as disclosed in note 16 to the financial statements.

2.15 Financial liabilities

Financial liabilities include other payables. Financial liabilities are recognised on the balance sheet when the Group becomes a party to the contractual provisions of the financial instrument.

Financial liabilities other than derivatives are recognised initially at fair value of consideration received less directly attributable transaction costs and subsequently measured at amortised cost using the effective interest method. Financial liabilities with short duration are not discounted.

A financial liability is derecognised when the obligation under the liability is extinguished. For financial liabilities other than derivatives, gains and losses are recognised in profit or loss when the liabilities are derecognised, and through the amortisation process. Any gains or losses arising from changes in fair value of derivatives are recognised in profit or loss. Net gains or losses on derivatives include exchange differences.

2.16 Impairment of Non-Financial Assets

The carrying amounts of the Group's non-financial assets subject to impairment are reviewed at each balance sheet date to determine whether there is any indication of impairment. If such indication exists, the asset's recoverable amount is estimated. An impairment loss is recognised whenever the carrying amount of an asset exceeds its recoverable amount. The recoverable amount is the greater of the asset's fair value less cost of disposal and its value in use. The value in use is the present value of estimated future cash flows expected to arise from the continuing use of the asset and from its disposal at the end of its useful life.

An impairment loss on a non-revalued asset is recognised in profit or loss. An impairment loss on a revalued asset is recognised in other comprehensive income to the extent that the impairment loss does not exceed the amount in the revaluation surplus for that same asset. An impairment loss (except for impairment loss on goodwill) is reversed if there has been a change in the estimates used to determine the recoverable amount or when there is an indication that the impairment loss recognised for the asset no longer exists or decreases. An impairment loss is reversed only to the extent that the asset's carrying amount does not exceed the carrying amount that would have been determined if no impairment loss had been recognised.

2.17 Leases

Operating Leases

Leases whereby the lessor effectively retains substantially all the risks and benefits of ownership of the leased item are classified as operating leases.

When the Group is the lessor, assets leased out under operating leases are included in investment property. Income arising from such operating lease is recognised on a straight line basis over the lease term.

When the Group is the lessee, operating lease payments are recognised as an expense in profit or loss on a straight line basis over the lease term.

2.18 Foreign Currency Transactions and Translation

Foreign currency transactions are recorded, on initial recognition, in the functional currency (Singapore dollars) by applying to the foreign currency amounts the rates of exchange prevailing on the transaction dates. Recorded monetary items that are denominated in foreign currencies as at balance sheet date are translated at the rates ruling on that date. Gain or losses on foreign currency translation are included in profit or loss. Non-monetary assets and liabilities that are measured in historical cost in a foreign currency are translated using the exchange rates as at the dates of the initial transactions. Non-monetary assets and liabilities measured at fair value in a foreign currency are translated using the exchange rates at the date when the fair value was determined.

2.19 Provisions

Provisions are recognised when the Group has a present legal or constructive obligation as a result of past events, it is probable that an outflow of resources will be required to settle the obligation, and a reliable estimate of the amount can be made.

2.20 Related Parties

A related party is defined as follows:

- (A) A person or a close member of that person's family is related to the reporting entity if that person:
- (i) Has control or joint control over the reporting entity;
 - (ii) Has significant influence over the reporting entity; or
 - (iii) Is a member of the key management personnel of the reporting entity or of a parent of the reporting entity.

- (B) An entity is related to the reporting entity if any of the following conditions applies:
- (i) The entity and the reporting entity are members of the same group (which means that each parent, subsidiary and fellow subsidiary is related to each other).
 - (ii) One entity is an associate or joint venture of the other entity (or an associate or joint venture of a member of a group of which the other entity is a member).
 - (iii) Both entities are joint ventures of the same third party;
 - (iv) One entity is a joint venture of a third entity and the other entity is an associate of the third entity.
 - (v) The entity is a post-employment benefit plan for the benefit of employees of either the College or an entity related to the reporting entity. If the reporting entity is itself such a plan, the sponsoring employers are also related to the reporting entity.
 - (vi) The entity is controlled or jointly controlled by a person identified in (A).
 - (vii) A person identified in (A)(i) has significant influence over the entity or is a member of the key management personnel of the entity (or of a parent of the entity).
 - (viii) The entity, or any member of a group of which it is a part, provides key management personnel services to the reporting entity or to the parent of the reporting entity.

23. FINANCIAL RISK MANAGEMENT

The Group and the College are exposed to financial risks arising from its operations and the use of financial instruments. The key financial risks are credit risk, liquidity risk and interest rate risk. The management reviews and agrees on policies for managing each of these risks and they are summarised below:

23.1 Credit risk

Credit risk is the potential risk of financial loss resulting from the failure of customers or other counterparties to settle their financial and contractual obligations to the Group as and when they fall due.

(i) *Risk Management*

The Group's exposure to credit risk arises primarily from trade and other receivables. For other financial assets, including cash and cash equivalents, the Company mitigates credit risks by transacting with high credit rating counterparties and financial institutions which are regulated.

Management regularly monitors credit risk exposure to customers. Cash and cash equivalents are placed with financial institutions which are regulated.

At the balance sheet date, there is no significant concentration of credit risk. The maximum exposure to credit risk is represented by the carrying amount of each financial asset in the balance sheet.

(ii) *Recognition of Expected Credit Losses (ECL)*

The Group's financial assets that are subject to credit losses where the expected credit loss model has been applied are trade receivables. The Group assesses on forward looking basis the expected credit losses on its trade receivables, and recognises a loss allowance in accordance with FRS 109.

Based on management's assessment, there is no significant ECL on the Group's receivables as at balance sheet date.

Impairment recognition in FY2018

Prior to 1 April 2018, the Group conducts ongoing credit evaluations on all customers and, where necessary, maintains an allowance for doubtful receivables which will adequately provide for potential credit risks. When there is objective evidence that the Group will not be able to collect all amounts due according to the original terms of the receivables, an impairment loss is recognised. Individual receivables which were known to be uncollectible were written off by reducing the carrying amount directly. The amount of the loss is recognised in profit or loss.

There were no financial assets that were impaired as at 31 March 2018.

23.2 Liquidity risk

Liquidity risk is the risk that the Group will encounter difficulty in meeting financial obligations due to shortage of funds.

The Group monitors its liquidity risk and maintains a level of cash and cash equivalents deemed adequate to finance the Group's operations and to mitigate the effects of fluctuations in cash flows.

All financial liabilities of the Group and the College are repayable on demand or will mature within one year.
